Here are nineteen walks around Harleston.

The footpaths are mostly in good condition but the river Waveney tends to flood, mainly in winter, so the floodplain is best avoided at these times.

Some of the walks cross the A143. During busy times this can be particularly dangerous.

There is some lane walking. These roads are quiet but take care all the same.

The website has GPX and KML downloads of the walks for use with handheld GPS receivers.

The trails have been shared on Wikiloc and you can use their "app" to follow the trails.

The maps have a QR code that takes you to the Wikiloc trail.
